ABOUT ORGANIZATION

DEVELOPMENT & RELIEF DEPARTMENT

Development & Relief Department is one of the Sub- Department of Rongmei Naga Baptist Association (RNBA) Registered as non-profit, non-political society in the year 1985 and currently working in north east region of India. Development & Relief Department is headed by a secretary and functioning with separate board member and identifying among the poor and marginalized. The major donors are Bread for the World, Germany, APPI Bangalore and NABARD – Manipur. At present, RNBA could make its presence in more than 51 villages benefitting some 12,000 families with crucial development Interventions.

Improved quality and dignity of human life through enhanced access to entitlements, land rights, livelihoods opportunities and sustainable agro-ecological practices, with focus on youth and women in Manipur, India.

Objective:

- ☞ To enhance access to Rights and Entitlements from the Government
- ☞ To enhance land rights with focus on women land rights
- ☞ To enhance Livelihood situation through green base income
- ☞ To promote sustainable NRM through Agro-ecological approaches

The activities taken up under BroT are Enhancing access to Entitlements, Enhancing land right with focus on women land rights, Livelihoods Improvement (green income), Sustainable NRM through Agro-ecological Approaches through complete community involvement in the form of formal village level institutions and working towards democratized local governance.

Project is proposed to be implemented by 6 NGOs in 29 villages in three hill and one valley districts covering about 21,000 people belonging to different ethnicity and religion. The sex Ratio at 950 females per 1000 male is little lower than that of the state average. The average family

size is about 6. There are Christians, Muslims and Hindus, belonging to about 10 major ethnic groups, with dominance of Rongmei and Meitei, followed by kukis.

Project area population is predominantly poor, as evidenced in the livelihood profile. Almost half of the households, wage labour are the main source of livelihood, followed by shifting cultivation and forest collections. Settled farming is practiced by only 5% of the households.

Over the last decade, the dependency in jhum (shifting cultivation) which has been the local tradition, culture and main food production system, seems to have reduced as per the land use changes information collected from sample project villages (2 villages from each of 6 NGOs). While on one-side the land under jhum, forest and forest-plantations has reduced, the land under horticulture, wetlands (fishery ponds in the valley) and infrastructure project has gone up. This reflects the type of development taking place, with trend shifting towards income and economic development.

This change in land use has also impacted the local land tenure. There has been increase in individual land and landless population at the cost of decrease in community rights.

Improved quality and dignity of human life through enhanced access to entitlements, land rights, livelihood opportunities and sustainable agro-ecological practices, with focus on youth and women in Manipur, India

The title itself represent improve quality and dignity of human through entitlements, land rights, livelihood and sustainable practices and this has replicate in the project villages through different activities taken up for the women SHGs, youth and community people at large. This has also assured security for marginal farmers of Manipur and it increases agriculture produce in the region and also enhances rights and sustainable agro ecological by providing trainings, awareness programmes and encouraging youth through sports and skills. Through this programme convergence with Government agencies such as ICAR (Indian Council of Agricultural Research), NABARD (National Bank for Agriculture and Rural Development) and CAU (Central Agricultural University)

This project is financially supported by Bread for the World (Bftw) for the period of three years (2017-2020).

Enhancing access to entitlements

Enhancing land rights with focus on women land rights

- ❑ Mapping of boundary and plots such as homestead, terrace, horticulture and the community reserve forest
- ❑ Training to VDC and village volunteer on mapping by DGPS
- ❑ Stakeholders consultation
- ❑ Awareness raising and informed advocacy (about rights affected and environmental implications) around mega projects
- ❑ Agreement on long term land use and managements has been signed with the land owners and the community people ensuring management and user land rights for the women SHGs.

Livelihood improvement (Green Income)

- ❑ Youth skill development training on 20 days has been conducted to improve their skills and livelihood
- ❑ Market information board has been provided in all the field villages to ensure the price of the local market comparing the other two nearest markets
- ❑ Training on book of accounts has provided to all the women SHGs in the project villages
- ❑ From the training provided, trainers are earning an income of 1000-2000 per month



Sustainable NRM through - Agro ecological approaches

- ❑ Forest based interventions - regeneration of local forest has been promoted in all the project villages by providing a total of 2500 saplings of myrhh and parkia (500 each per village)
- ❑ Homestead systems which comprises of planting of tree, crops and livestock in and around the house has been promoted in all the project villages for 31 SHGs members

- ❑ Horticulture system has been provided to 41 farmers and 29 women SHGs provided cultivation of traditional crops such as maize, millet and black rice has been carried out
- ❑ Dietary diversity at least 3 locally produced nutritious food has been added to regular food basket

The APPI Project aims to build resilience of small farms in 20 villages across 5 Districts of Manipur (Tamenglong, Bishnupur, Chandel and 2 new formed districts Longmai and Tengnoupal), facing climate change and market induced vulnerabilities, for enhancing consumption of local nutritious food and ensuring sustainably progressive farm income of the vulnerable farming communities. The project is implemented by 3 NGO partners –RNBA (Rongmei Naga Baptist Association), PHDO (Plain and Hills Development Organisation) and CWG (Centre for Women and Girls).

Objectives:

- Ensured Sustaining Productivity of Small Farms with Improvement in diversity of and nutrition from food produced from it and months under food production
- 30% incremental income from small farms
- Community well being improved, institutions functioned democratically, mainstreamed agroecology (sustainable) farming among the communities
- Improved policy & systems at village and district level for the small and marginal farmers

- Civil Society Organizations take the system as one major development agenda among the communities on sustainable development of the communities particularly for small and marginal farmers
- Enhanced Capacity of the Small & Marginal Farmers and Partners NGOs on integrated and sustainable farming.

Highlights of the year 2017-2018

- Formed 103 SHGs across 5 Districts (Tamenglong, Bishnupur, Chandel and 2 new formed districts Longmai and Tengnoupal).
- Given more than 1600 direct support to farmers across 20 target villages.
- Through the activity of SRI with black rice and khaichum, more than 24,000 fingerlings were distributed to the farmers across 10 villages.
- Organized 23 trainings to enhanced capacity of the small and marginal farmers and partners NGOs on integrated and sustainable farming.
- 431 farmers participated in 3 seed fairs conducted in Khumji, Khopinam and Ithai Khunou village of Bishnupur District.
- 3 common process facility set up in 3 village under 3 different district (Tamenglong, Bishnupur, Tengnoupal)
- Interface convergence with NABARD has led to construction of public water tanks in 2 villages, Viz Namthan and Taudaijang village under Longmai District.

Project Activities

a. Ensured Sustaining Productivity of Small Farms with Improvement in diversity of and nutrition from food produced from it and months under food production

With the turn of the end of year 2017, RNBA entered its 2nd phase of the project. During this period, we saw remarkable achievements. Since the main agenda of RNBA is to build a self reliant society among small and marginal farmers, we focused on creating tangible impact towards sustainable environment and empowering vulnerable groups and women to improve their livelihood. The project operated through 20

villages of the following 5 Districts: Tamenglong, Longmai, Bishnupur, Chandel and Tengnoupal.

- For activity SRI with black rice and khaichum, 179 farmers is directly supported with the cost of seed, distributed fingerlings and other organic inputs were provided. They were also given trainings, exposure visit for better and faster adoption of technology.
- Integrated Farming System (IFS) focuses on increasing farm productivity by increasing diversification, resource integration and creating market linkages. In the 2nd phase of the project, we were able to succeed in achieving 58 more farmers than the target set with the total of 583 farmers from 20 project villages.
- To reduce the expenditure and dependence on chemical inputs, esp. Pesticides/fungicides and also to promote agriculture with positive implication on human health, nutrition and family income, 158 farmers were promoted in production and use of organic inputs.
- Taking benefit of government program and also to provide farmers information about their soil fertility and quality, 405 soil health cards were obtained for the farmers of 20 villages from line dept. Such as KVK, ICAR and Agriculture Dept.
- In the 2nd phase of the project, we supported 206 farmers to bring back, reintroduce and promote pollinators and predators by providing bee boxes, bee hotels, trainings and relay cropping.
- NREGS through provision of farmers support around land and water resource developments and plantations, composting, livestock shed improvements etc, to sensitize and help farmers improve productivity and production, RNBA facilitated planning support to 2 project villages Viz Namthan and Taudaijang of Longmai District.
- Millets and traditional crops/varieties have gradually been replaced with market influenced crops and varieties, which are not well adaptive to local market and food systems. In order to promote revival of millets and traditional crops/varieties, we have supported 75 farmers in the 2nd phase of the project period.

b. 30% Incremental Income from Small Farms

- To optimise collective action, share and enhance knowledge, inputs and augment efficiency and more specifically to reach scale in

farming and marketing, we have supported 339 farmers through SHGs from 20 project villages to promote cooperative farming of locally important crops.

- Gap in physical infrastructure remain a big bottleneck in promoting value chain development around agriculture commodities, especially in remote areas. While attempting to bridge the gap we have set up another 3 common process facility in 3 villages (Kabuikhullen, Meipou and IthaiKhunou).
 - To ensure aggregation and marketing, partner NGOs from 3 districts have facilitated in collective marketing, temporary storage, visiting trader and negotiation for 2 VLFs (Village Level Federation) and a Society run by women from Bishnupur.
 - Realising the quantum and duty bound nature of Govt funding, we have accelerated successfully in convergence with Govt schemes such as NABARD supported Gaithao Producer Company Limited, covering 360 farmers as share holders presently and Springshed programme, solar installation by SELCO Foundation in our project villages - Taudaijang, Kabuikhullen, Okoklong and Namthan, convergence with NERCORMP & MSRLM and SALT(Sustainable Agro Livestock Technology) program through District Administration.
- c. Community well being improved, institutions functioned democratically, mainstreamed agroecology (sustainable) farming among the communities**
- There have been excellent examples of learning sustainable integrated farming practices created through exposure visit and cross learning. This year 3 exposure visits and cross learning were organised for 3 partner NGOs' Teams and farmers.
 - Considering the principles of agriculture extension, all such new practices/ technologies and processes require a communication trajectory considering use of different medium. Therefore, 4 trainings of Trainers were conducted on SRI, IFS, pollinators & predators and organic input.
 - Considering the differences in language, ethnicity, exposure receptivity and knowledge levels of farmers across partners, 19

trainings at partners' level for farmers were conducted to train and expose differently.

- With support from APPI, considering the need and impact of animated communication on the farmers, we have approached and developed IEC materials on SRI, IFS, Pollinators/ Natural Predators, organic inputs, group farming, marketing to impart the basic information and knowledge to farmers, enhance their yield and in order to confront challenges.

Success story:

From being a Trainee to Trainer

Mr. Jokngampou Rongmei from Taudaijang village having strong interpersonal skills and good track record with an intent to learn has benefited him after attending 2 bee keeping training conducted by RNBA. While he is talented and hardworking, the trainings he attended further equipped him the art of bee keeping processes. He is now at the point where he is capable to teach other trainees. He was one of the trainers as a trained bee keeper at the most recent training organised by RNBA at Longmai II. RNBA intend to have him as a trainer in the future trainings as well.
