

STRUCTURE OF RNBA



Improved Ecosystem Governance for Resilient Local Livelihoods & Sustainable Development (Brot)

Trainings at RRC level for leadership and personality development of project team around PES, NBS, LTS Convergence, Documentation, Reporting, Monitoring and Evaluation and other livelihood training.

Awareness on payment for ecosystem services was conducted for the staff of RNBA with an objective to learn and understand n-depth of carbon markets, Payment for Ecosystem Services (PES), and nature-based solutions (NBS). The workshop also aims to foster knowledge-sharing, active participation, and discussions on implementing these concepts within local contexts.



RNBA staff attended a workshop on PES, community stewardship and forest governance at Himachal Pradesh Institute of Public Administration (HIPA)

Payment for Eco-system services:

Awareness meeting was conducted on PES and land rights at RNBA office, Imphal with the civil society organizations (Rongmei Luphwam, RNPO, RNYOM). Discussed issues on the tribal land rights, tenure system, and land holding system, carbon and tribal forest.



Awareness on forest protection and management were conducted at Khoupum cluster. Village Development Committee (VDCs) were strengthened during the awareness meeting in regards to conserve and restore the community reserve forest land to maintain good and healthy forest by planting more trees, herbs, climbers and shrubs for the years to come.

Livelihood:



417 farmers were supported under livelihood program (SALT farming/Seasonal crops and Homestead system). Training on SALT farm, homestead system and seasonal cropping were provided in all the targeted villages. On-spot verification, interaction with beneficiaries, contour line making, A-Frame making with the beneficiaries were carried out during the training.

Land Rights:

300 individual plots were mapped, 11 village boundaries mapped and 34 Land Tenure Certificate were provided for the farmers. Consultation meetings on land use planning were conducted in 12 project villages of Tamenglong and Khoupum Clusters. These sessions were held with the participation of village leaders including members of the Village Authority (VA), Pei, Youth, Women's Society, and other local leaders addressing customary land ownership challenges, legal frameworks, and the importance of formal documentation to reduce land disputes and promote sustainable community development.



Rights and Entitlements:

1764 (Individuals and Households) were accessed to schemes such as Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana (Housing scheme), Education through scholarship, Health scheme and Insurance through health card and Financial Inclusion. 202 individuals accessed to scholarship under Education, 306 households under Housing scheme, 18 women self-help group accessed to Revolving Fund of Rs. 2500 for each group and Rs. 30,000/- Start-Up funds under Financial Inclusion and 713 individuals accessed to health card under Health and Insurance. 525 individuals have accessed to other schemes such as Ema-Nongthangleima scheme, old age etc.



Convergence with the Govt. department and line department: Through convergence with the govt department and line departments RNBA has received 200 orange saplings for the farmers and seasonal crop seeds from the KVK/ICAR, Tamenglong District to support sustainable agriculture practices in the targeted villages, empowering farmers with quality inputs.

Inclusive Land Tenure Security and Ensured Sustainable Livelihood for tribal and PVTG of Manipur (APF)

RNBA organized the **Launching & Orientation Program** on October 22, 2024, to mark the second phase of the project supported by the Azim Premji Foundation, Bangalore. The event was held at the RNBA Conference Hall in Imphal. A total of 20 participants attended, including 4 women and 16 men.



Seminar on Traditional land Tenure System with traditional land owners, leaders and CSOs on 18th December 2024 at Thiulon Village, Tamenglong District Manipur. The seminar, led by Dimgong Rongmei, Executive Director of RNBA, along with RNBA staff, on 18th December 2024 focused on two critical issues: land rights and education. The seminar highlighted the importance of initiating land mapping and creating formal records to prevent disputes and ensure equitable access to land.



First Annual Assembly of the **Minority Tribes Development Council, Manipur (MTDCM)** brought together representatives from 12 tribal groups of the state. The assembly centred its discussions on the recognition of these communities as Particularly Vulnerable Tribal Groups (PVTGs). It also emphasized the urgent need to strengthen land tenure security for the hill tribes of Manipur.



RNBA, with support from the Azim Premji Foundation, Bangalore, organized a two-day **Comprehensive Training on Mushroom Cultivation** for Community Resource persons from 12 villages. The program was attended by 20 participants, including 7 women and 13 men. Miss Abigail Phaomei, an expert in mushroom cultivation practices, served as the resource person for the training.





MUSHROOM CULTIVATION SET-UP

Under APF supported project, RNBA have formed 10 CIGs in 5 villages; Mapao Thangal, Thangal Surung, Laikot Kharam, Waithou Chiru and Uran Chiru. Total CIG members undertaking mushroom cultivation is 43 members from 5 village.

- Mapao Thangal village, 2 CIGs from 2 SHGs were formed, each CIG has 4 members
- Thangal Surung village, 2 CIGs from 2 SHGs were formed, each CIG has 4 members
- Laikot Kharam village, 3 CIGs from 3 SHGs were formed, each CIG has 4 members
- Waithou Chiru village, 2 CIGs from 2 SHGs were formed, each CIG has 5 members
- Uran Chiru village, 1 CIG from 1 SHG was formed, CIG has a member of 5

The process and set up of the CIGs in 5 villages started from 20th January till 8th February 2025. Set up went hand in hand with mushroom cultivation training in each village.

RNBA organized a Livestock Care & Management Training Program on 21st February 2025 at Tarung, Imphal. The training covered topics such as breed selection, housing, feeding, and disease management in livestock. All 12 Community Resource Persons (CRPs) attended the program.



Laikot village in Kangpokpi district, home to the Kharam community, has long faced severe water scarcity, forcing families to buy water at high costs. In November 2024, RNBA and the Village Development Committee installed a borewell to address the crisis. The VDC will manage its upkeep through small household contributions, and RNBA will assess its impact in the years to come









Springshed Based Watershed Development Program under NABARD-Manipur Regional Office

Purpose of the project:

Due to overexploitation of natural resources the north eastern region of India including Manipur is confronted with two major water related problems;

- (i) Heavy and intense rainfall leading to soil erosion and pollution of water bodies and
- (ii) Drought leading to acute scarcity of water. These need to be managed for enhancing agricultural productivity, augmenting income and preventing degradation of soil and water, which can be addressed by springshed based watershed development programs.

Objectives of the project:

- Revival of drying springs for irrigation and drinking water purpose
- Afforestation for restoration of ecological balance
- Community development and participation through involvement of Villag Watershed Committee (VWC) in planning, implementation, monitoring, and supervision of watershed development activities
- Integration of women and livelihood development interventions to promote equity among the watershed families.



Staggered Trench (Staggered Contour Trenches):

Staggered Contour Trenches (SCTs) are trenches dug in a trapezoid shape having one pair of parallel sides. We had dug out 80 SCTs and 20 SCTs structures in Ramsunathuak and Neidanduak sprinshed areas respectively after measuring degree of land slope. This structure of trenches will help infiltrate the water in the subsurface, maintain soil and water conservation measures.



Dry Land Bench Terrace:

Dry land bench terraces are a series of level running across the slope at vertical intervals, supported by risers. The terrace was constructed across the slope to intercept the surface runoff and to reduce the soil loss. It helps to conserve soil moisture and fertility.

Brush Wood Dam:

Brush wood dam is a temporary structure made of available brush such as branches and leaves of trees or plants, stems of bushy plants, etc. which is placed across the gully formation. It is a double row brush wood dam. Altogether we have constructed 40 brush wood dams each in the catchment areas of Ramsunathuak and Duipangjang springs. This structure is to check and control soil erosion and to find material carried by flowing water in the gully.



Earth Dug-out Pond:

Earth dug-out pond is a farm pond constructed for the purpose of storing water from surface runoff. The site of the pond was built at Ramsunathuak catchment area above the horticulture plantation area for drifting of water for horticultural crops and for recharge of the spring.



Non-wadi Based Tribal Development Fund (TDF) Project under NABARD

Purpose of the project:

The aim of the Tribal Development Fund is to enable integrated development of tribal dominated villages with focus on sustainable agriculture practices and allied activities encompassing the entire chain of interventions.

Objectives of the project:

- Create replicable models of integrated development of tribal families on participatory basis, through adoption of sustainable income generating activities based on potential of the area and the tribal needs;
- Build and strengthen tribal institutions, which would enable the communities to be partners in policy formulation, execution of programs and improve social and economic status and;
- Build and strengthen producers' organizations

A total of 200 households will benefit directly from this program while the entire village will see developmental growth due to the numerous economic opportunities the program will generate. The beneficiaries include some of the poorest of poor households, widows, and other vulnerable households. The PIA will be implementing a TDF program on non-orchard based in the aforementioned 7 (seven) villages.

Construction of community tank for Bamboo Shoots Fermentation:



RNBA in collaboration with the beneficiaries through Village Planning Committee (VPCs) had been successfully constructed 4 community tanks at Dolang, Namkaolong, Gangluan-I and Gangluan Pinjang-IV villages respectively.



In this regard, the beneficiaries and women Self Help Group (SHGs) through VPCs have started collecting fresh bamboo shoots and stored in the tanks for the purpose of bamboo fermentation process and further value addition of the product.

Goatery:

During the first six months of the project, out of 100 beneficiaries of goat, 15 beneficiaries were identified based on their economic conditions and needs. Thereby, 7 beneficiaries in Namkaolong village and 8 beneficiaries in Dolang village were distributed goat through Village Planning Committees (VPCs). However, with the assistance of the Veterinary Department, Government of Manipur, we



were able to vaccinate all goats in both the villages and processed insurance for 60 goats at the National Insurance Company Ltd (NIC) in Imphal.

Construction of Common Primary Processing and Storage/CFC:

The CFC is a processing unit or house for bamboo and banana products, installed machinery, NTFPs storage and processing unit among other developments in the



village. During the project implementation, we have constructed CFCs at Gangluan-II, Gangluan pingjang, Namkaolong and Dolang villages respectively. Further, RNBA in collaboration with the Village Planning Committee (VPCs) have installed machineries such as 28 panels of Solar Module, 28 (12 volt each) of Solar Battery, 7 units of Solar Inverter and 14 units of Ceiling Fan respectively with the technical support by Selco Foundation.

Need based Capacity Building Program:

One day training program on goaterly was organised on 30th August, 2024 at the conference hall of RNBA. The



program was facilitated by Mrs. Sinyorita, SMS animal's expert, ICAR-KVK Tamenglong. Siyorita said that goat rearing is an enterprise which has been practiced by a large section of population in rural areas. Goat can efficiently survive on available shrubs and trees in adverse harsh environments in low fertility lands where no other crop can be grown. Goats create employment to the rural poor.

Housing management of goats- construct a shed on dry and properly raised ground. The shed should be 10 feet high and should have good ventilation. Avoid water-logging and marshy areas. Proper disposal of dung and urine and avoid over stocking or crowding.

Deworming of goats- Deworm the doe before breeding season. Deworm kids at one month of age and repeat it at two months of age. Deworm is 2-3 weeks before kidding.

There were 66 trainees participated at the one day mushroom cultivation program from 7 villages namely; Namkaolong, Gangluan-1, Gangluan-II, Gangluan-III, Gangluan-IV pinjang, Gangluan-V and Dolang villages respectively.

Niranthara NorthEast Programme

Overview: Niranthara NorthEast Programme purposefully designed for emerging NGO in Northeastern States of Assam, Arunachal, Manipur, Meghalaya, Mizoram, Nagaland & Tripura. This is collaboration between Dhvani Foundation Bangalore and RNBA Manipur to achieve the Niranthara Promise in the Northeast region for 3 years

Scope of the partnership: Shikshak Model- Build Operate and Transfer (BOT) to ensure that the Local organizations to grow as 'Mini Dhvani' in the local regions. RNBA as Shikshak partner with Dhvani in Northeast Region for Dhvani to implement BOT model, expected to take 3 years to reach the final goal of making RNBA as Mini Dhvani ending by March 2028.

DASRA UK is a program nurturing women leadership in Climate Action representing Sloping Agriculture Land Technology (SALT) and Forest Restoration of Locally Important Species (FORLIS). It is a program to build momentum for women's and girl's empowerment within climate agenda and strategy.

- To introduce SALT for improved soil management and sustainable agriculture on hilly terrain.
- To raise awareness on Forest restoration of locally important species.

Success Story of

Mrs. Pouduanliu Malingmei

Location : Khangchiuluan Village

Field : Seasonal Crop Cultivation



A Journey of Strength and Survival

Mrs. Pouduanliu Malingmei is an industrious farmer hailing from Khangchiuluan village, situated at Latitude: 24° 58' 0.12" N and Longitude: 93° 32' 60.00" E, within the Tamenglong District of Manipur. She sustains a large family comprising nine children and eleven grandchildren. In 1992, amidst the Naga-Kuki conflict, she and her family were compelled to abandon their home in Mukti village and rebuild their lives in Khangchiuluan.

In the early days, life was very difficult. They relied on traditional jhum farming, worked as laborers on other farms, and collected wild fruits and vegetables from the forest. With limited resources, they could manage only one farm, as the family members had to split their time between farming and finding ways to survive.

Challenges on the Field: Farming was tough. The biggest problems were:

- The topography of the villages atop steep and rocky hill compels the inhabitants to traverse considerable distances for agricultural endeavours.
- No money to hire labor or buy good-quality seeds.
- Floods ruined the land, covering it with too much sand.
- Crop pests made the situation even worse.
- Low harvests meant less food and less income.

These struggles made it hard to feed the family or earn a stable income. But they didn't give up.

Turning Things Around: Mrs. Malingmei plans:

- Grow commercial crops to sell in the market and earn money.
- Grow food crops to feed the family and improve their health.
- Choose better land for farming and plant crops suited to the soil and weather.

Success and Growth:

- They could pay for their children’s education with the money they earned.
- Their food expenses dropped because they grew more of their own vegetables.
- They learned to plant smarter, choosing crops that resist pests and sell well in the market.

What Helped Them Succeed: Several factors played a big role in their success:

- Hard work and teamwork within the family.
- Choosing the right land and crops.
- Sharing labor and knowledge with fellow farmers.
- Support from RNBA, which shared useful tips on sustainable farming.

Advice to Other Farmers: *Mrs. Malingmei believes farmers should talk to each other, share experiences, and learn together. Every farmer’s situation is different, so sharing stories helps everyone find new ideas and solution learned from past failures and successes.*

Conclusion: *Mrs. Pouduanliu Malingmei’s story is one of courage, hard work, and determination. From losing her home to building a better life through farming, she shows that success doesn’t come easy but it’s possible when you don’t give up.*

Flood Relief in Manipur

1. Background:

In May - June 2025, severe monsoon rains triggered by a cyclonic system caused widespread flooding in Northeast India. The Imphal east district of Manipur and adjoining regions in Arunachal Pradesh experienced river overflows, embankment breaches, and landslides.

RNBA, along with NorthEast Together (NET) network and partner CSOs, activated its rapid response mechanism to support affected families, focusing on the most vulnerable communities in relief camps and hard-to-reach rural areas.

2. RNBA's processes in Relief Effort:

RNBA's Relief Committee coordinated efforts to deliver timely aid to affected families in 3 districts of Manipur through site visits, data collection of severe affected families, issued of purchased order, procurement of relief items and distribution with the help of local volunteers and relief camp committees, we eased some burdens on those floods affected families, providing essential relief items timely despite recent bans in Manipur Valley.

Summary of roles effort from various stakeholders as under:

- Led coordinated planning and response through NorthEast Together (NET)
- Established and managed community kitchens in 3 districts
- Mobilized over 50 local volunteers and relief camp committees for logistics, and outreach
- Coordinated dry ration and hygiene kit distribution in highly impacted and inaccessible zones

3. Affected Regions with relief intervened:

Manipur: Imphal East, Imphal West, Heingang, Wangkhei, Khurai, Checkon, and Sekmajjin Hangoon Awang.

4. Relief implementation:

Dry Ration & Hygiene Kit Distribution:

- 156 families covered dry ration included dal, oil, soyabean, biscuits, salt, potatoes, rice flakes, onion, garlic, dry chilli, masala.
- 265 Hygiene kit: sanitary napkins, phenyl, soap, bleaching powder.

Community Kitchens:

- 9,170 cooked meals served to 1,834 families 5 times meal
- Dry ration to 156 families more vulnerable families
- Hygiene kit to deserving 265 families
- Total reach out to 1,834 families (Community kitchen , dry ration & hygiene kit)

1. Introduction

In response to the recent floods that severely impacted several regions across Manipur, RNBA conducted a targeted relief intervention to support the most affected and vulnerable households. The objective was to ensure immediate access to essential items, restore basic dignity, and reduce the risk of disease outbreaks among displaced and flood-affected families.

2. Coverage Summary

- Total Households Reached: 854
- Total Locations Covered: 17 villages/settlements
- Target Group: Flood-affected households, prioritizing families with no stable shelter, widows, elderly, single-headed households, and families with young children.




